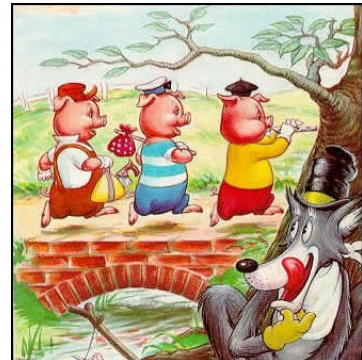

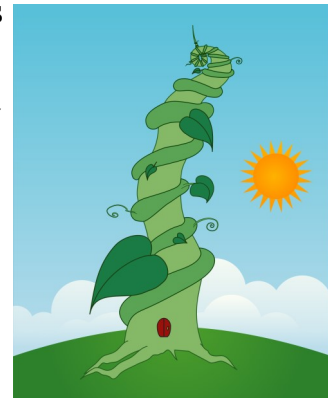
### **A Mixed-Up Fairytale by Phoebe L (Year 2)**
