Dear Families,

On Monday 25<sup>th</sup> September we were happy to welcome Katie from the Blue Cross. Katie joined us for collective worship to talk to the children about Safety around Dogs. The children learned how to read the signs of Dog Body Language, so they are able to identify when a dog is relaxed and happy or when it is tense and unsure. They learned how to keep themselves safe at home using the rhyme, 'If a dog is EATING or with its TOY... ...LEAVE THEM TO ENJOY!! Quiet and slow... ...IS THE WAY TO GO!!'

Katie talked to them about canine choice and they learned the **3C's**:

- **CHECK** - Always check with the owner first
- **CALL** - Call the dog to you by patting your legs and saying a friendly "hello"
- **COUNT** - If the dog happily approaches use one hand to COUNT 3 strokes on the shoulder then STOP

The children got to practice the 3C's with Katie's special puppy that she brought along.

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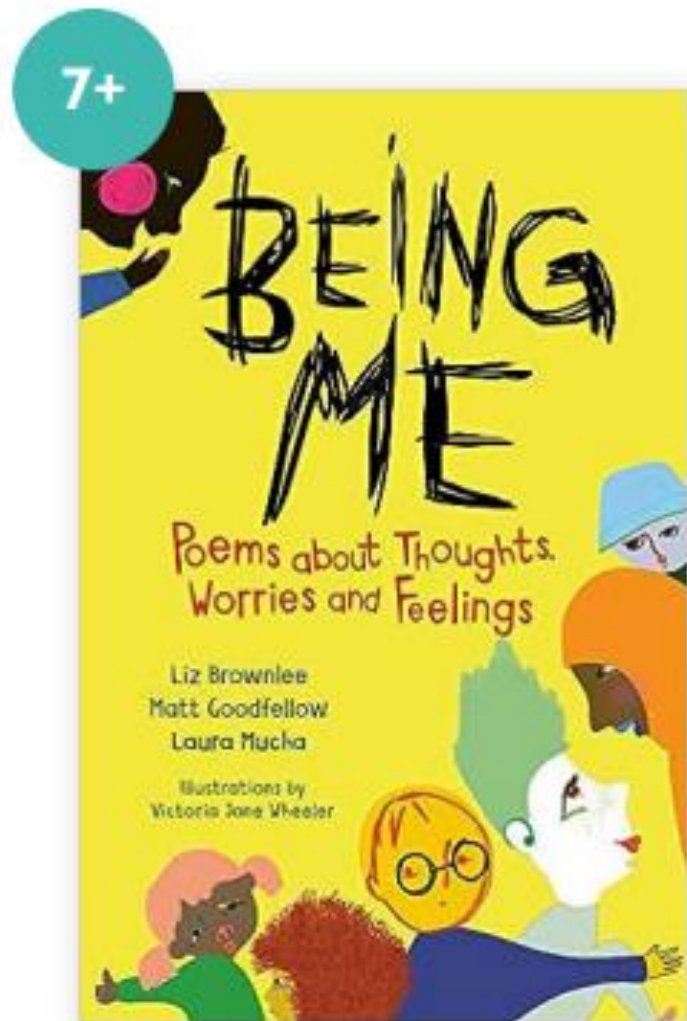
## Being Me

As a valued member of Lambourn's school community, I am delighted to inform you that there are **3** parent governor vacancies you may wish to apply for. All parents (or those with parental responsibility) of registered pupils are eligible and encouraged to apply for these positions. A letter about nominations, the process and application form will be sent separately to all parents.

Mrs Hanson has found some interesting recipes that are affordable and might encourage the children to try something new. Who could resist a Cowboy Pie!

### Cowboy Pie

#### Ingredients

- 2 tsp [sunflower oil](#)
- 1 [onion](#), finely chopped
- 8 pork sausages, cut into bitesize pieces\*
- 2 [garlic cloves](#), crushed or finely grated
- 2 tsp [hot smoked paprika](#)
- 2 x 410g cans baked beans
- 3 tbsp barbecue sauce

(\*Replace the Pork sausages for your favourite vegetarian variety)

#### For the mashed potato

- 1 kg [potatoes](#), peeled and roughly chopped
- 50g [butter](#)
- 4 tbsp [milk](#)
- 75g [grated cheddar](#)
- 2 tbsp chopped chives, to garnish, optional



#### Method

**STEP 1** - First, make the mashed potato. Bring a large pan of salted water to the boil over a medium heat, then carefully tip in the chopped potatoes. Cook for 15-20 mins until tender. Drain, then tip back into the pan and leave to air-dry for a couple of minutes before mashing. Tip in the butter and milk, and stir through until combined. Set aside with the lid on to keep warm.

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- **STEP 2** - Heat the oven to 200C/180C/gas 6. While the potatoes are cooking, heat the oil in a frying pan or [saucepan](#) over a medium heat and fry the onion for 6-8 mins until softened. Tip in the sausage pieces and fry for 4 mins until browned all over, then add the garlic and cook for 1 min before stirring in the smoked paprika and cooking for 1 min more. Pour in the beans and barbecue sauce and cook until just about to simmer before removing from the heat.
- **STEP 3** - Spoon the sausage and bean mixture into an ovenproof tin or dish (ours was 20x20cm), then spoon over the mashed potato and sprinkle the grated cheddar on top. Bake in the oven for 25-30 mins until bubbling round the edges and the cheese is golden. Remove from the oven and scatter over the chives, if using.

## Lunchbox Pasta

### Ingredients

- 400g [pasta](#)
- 4-5 tbsp fresh [pesto](#)
- 1 tbsp mayonnaise
- 2 tbsp Greek yogurt
- ½ [lemon](#), juiced
- 200g mixed cooked veg such as peas, green beans, courgette (chop the beans and courgette into pea-sized pieces)
- 100g [cherry tomatoes](#), quartered
- 200g [cooked chicken](#), ham, prawns, hard-boiled egg or cheese



### Method

#### • STEP 1

Cook the pasta in boiling water until it is al dente, so about 11 mins, but refer to the pack instructions. Drain and tip into a bowl. Stir in the pesto and leave to cool.

#### • STEP 2

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When the pasta is cool, stir through the mayo, yogurt, lemon juice and veg. Spoon into lunchboxes or on to pasta plates and put the cooked chicken or protein of your choice on top. Chill until ready to eat if intended for a packed lunch.
